

Dear Archie, Tayler, Ruby, Turlisa, Jack, Danny and Charlie,

Thank you all for your letters and for your interest in Conservatism. I was impressed with the thought that went into your questions – I can tell you have been paying attention in your government and democracy lessons.

There are some common themes across your letters, so I hope one letter, where I try to cover all of the points you have raised will suffice.

As the leader of the Conservative Party, I am focused on designing policy which goes back to first principles in terms of what it means to be a Conservative. I think Conservatives value principles like:

- **Truth** For too long, politics has been about working out what the voters want to hear then saying it back to them better to deal with hard truths today than big problems tomorrow. This has been the central failure of politics for 25 years. Maybe even longer. That has to change.
- **Family** The foundation of our society is not the individual; it is the family. We need to place them at the centre of our policies and our actions.
- Personal responsibility Government should nurture a fair and safe society in
  which people can prosper by their own efforts. Government cannot solve all our
  problems and nor should it try to. Government should do fewer things, but the
  things it does do, it should do with brilliance.
- **Citizenship** Citizenship is not just about having a passport; it is a commitment to a country and the people in it. Our country is our home, and we need to look after it. No one else will.

# Norfolk County Council SEND survey 2025

Whether you are a parent/carer, a professional, a child or young person please take the time to complete the SEND survey. It gives everyone the chance to give their views about SEND services and support in Norfolk.

There is a wide range of support and alternative formats to help you complete the survey click here to find out more.

The more feedback we get the more accurate picture we have of:

- How people in Norfolk are experiencing SEND services and support
- What we need to improve

Places of learning are encouraged to make time for children and young people with SEND to complete the survey, however if your child does not attend a place of learning, please support your child to complete the SEND survey at home.

### How is your feedback used?

We read all SEND survey feedback and act on it. Our last SEND survey was in 2023 and after analysing the survey feedback, we produced a 2023 survey summary and three reports. Senior leaders used the reports' findings to act on what needs to happen to improve the lives of children and young people with SEND, and their families and it also helped us to shape our Norfolk Area SEND and Alternative Provision Strategy (NASAPS). The feedback also led to different teams taking actions which you can read about in our 'You said, We did' SEND in Norfolk report 2023-2024. Other activity is still happening as part of our Local Area Inclusion Plan.

After the 2025 survey, we will publish feedback reports on the SEND Local Offer for everyone to read. We will use the results to help us update our Local Area Inclusion Plan for 2025-2027 and also publish a yearly progress update on actions every July.

The survey closes on 23rd February 2025.
