MESSAGE FROM THE HEADTEACHER



Following discussions with Student Council and staff, we are considering introducing hot meals and earlier this week had a company in with a selection of foods for staff and students to try. The choice included macaroni cheese, sweet and sour chicken, rice and roast potatoes as well as a

vegetarian option and 2 desserts which were ginger sponge and apple crumble.

Students tried all the options available and reported back the food was delicious.

The cost of the meals is likely to be around £3.10 per day which will include a hot main meal and either a hot or cold dessert. There is a minimum take up required to make this viable so after half term, a poll will be sent to all parents, carers and staff where you can say if you would be interested in this option for your child, how many days per week you are likely to take up the option and ask any further questions.

Al can be used as government propaganda and be spread around social media by using the faces of prime minister candidates in compromising or embarrassing scenarios.



Kinship Care

Kinship care is when a child lives full-time or most of the time with a relative or close family friend, usually because their parents are not able to care for them.

Grandparents are the most common kinship carers, but older siblings, aunts, uncles, and people who know the child well can also take on the role.

Being a kinship carer is rewarding, but hard. Talking about what you're experiencing can really help.

So whether it's one of our advice workers, or another kinship carer, find someone to talk to. There are lots of different ways you can access help and advice from Kinship. - 1. To support kinship carers to understand the needs of the children they care for either through direct intervention or signposting to appropriate services
- 2. To consider financial support for kinship carers and review this annually when money is being paid
- 3. To offer advice, support and signposting to all Norfolk kinship carers.

More than anything, we promise to keep children's safety and wellbeing at the heart of all we do.

The kinship support team is a large multi-disciplinary team of more than 20 people, including:

- Social workers
- Occupational therapists
- Support workers
- Duty workers
- Support and contact co-ordinators
- Therapeutic parenting worker

Once you have been awarded a special guardianship order, you can contact the kinship support team on <u>01603 224131</u> for support.

If the child was previously looked after by the local authority, they can access a needs assessment via the team. This may result in recommendation for intervention including therapies which would be funded via the <u>adoption and</u> <u>special guardianship support fund</u>.

If the child was not previously looked after, the team can offer advice and signposting to other services.
